British Values

Recent dreadful world events have no shocked most of us and have certainly been talked about by our children. They have inevitably raised some really contentious issues that place real pressures on us all, and no less those of us in a primary school which to reassure our children but also teach them to understand the bigger picture. In our school we teach children to be respectful of each other and we believe that by learning about the differences and beliefs of others we will develop a greater understanding and tolerance. Our 'One Word School Rule' matches this aim.

The definition of 'British values' is set out in the Government 'Prevent' strategy, and we reinforce these regularly and in the following ways:

<u>Democracy:</u> Democracy is rife in our schools! Pupils have their voices heard through our School Council and Pupil questionnaires. We elect House Captains, our School Council, as well as vote on 'Charity for the Year'.

The Rule of Law: The importance of Law, i.e. those that govern the class, the school, or the country, are consistently reinforced, as well as when dealing with behaviour and through school assemblies. Pupils are taught the value and reasons behind laws, that govern and protect us, responsibilities this involves and the consequences when laws are broken. Visits from authorities such as the Police; Fire Service; Lifeguards etc. are regular parts of our calendar. Pupil are regularly rewarded for great behaviour with stars, certificates 'postcards home' etc etc

Individual Liberty: Our pupils are actively encouraged to make choices, knowing that they are in a safe and supportive environment. We educate and provide boundaries for children to make choices safety. Pupils are encouraged to know, understand and exercise their rights and personal freedoms through our E-Safety and PSHE lessons. Pupils are given the freedom to make choices.

Mutual Respect: Our school ethos and behaviour policy revolves around our core values such as Appreciation - our 'one word school rule' . Assemblies relate to what this means. Posters around the school promote respect for others and this is reiterated through our classroom and learning rules, as well as our behaviour policy.

Tolerance of those of Different Faiths and Beliefs: This is achieved through enhancing pupils understanding of their place in a culturally diverse society. We offer opportunities to experience diversity through visits to places of worship and year group links to other schools in areas which are different to our own. Assemblies and discussions involving prejudices and prejudice-based bullying are followed and supported by learning in RE and PSHE.

Myths and Legends

A selection of comments and misconceptions we sometimes hear 'It fine... if I am late and cant get there for the end of the school day they can just go with.....'

We absolutely do NOT allow this. It is vital the school knows exactly who children leave with. Ad-hoc arrangements like this place ALL children in danger because we simply can't 'police' that the children are leaving the school with the right people. ALWAYS contact the school first if arrangements need to change.

Weekly Safety Question ... Each week we ask the children a quick 'outside of school' safety question and we help them answer it. We would be grateful if parents could help us at home by giving the same message. This week:

'How do you cross the road safely?'

(*Tips:* Children need to learn how to cross the road safely. In 2010, around 19 child pedestrians (aged 0-11) were killed or seriously injured every week in Britain. The Green Cross Code is taught in schools but needs to be reinforced from home - and not just by memorising the words, but by parents practicing and explaining the code to their children. Do you know it? Do you follow it? The code is for everyone)

To prevent serious accidents to children, please note that


parents are NOT permitted to drive and park on the school site during the school day i.e. between 8.30am-5.00pm.

PANTS -The Underwear Rule

In school we teach children about how to keep safe and when they should tell adults about things that happen to them that seem wrong. The NSPCC have developed some really good rules to help children understand where and when it is wrong to be touched by another person. They call it the 'Underwear Rule' and use the word PANTS to help children understand the elements. We aim to introduce this to children shortly.

How and when to start conversations with your child about keeping themselves safe.

The NSPCC suggest small, honest and open conversations are the best way to introduce the 'Underwear Rule' to keep your child safe and talk about keeping safe. Inevitably your child will have questions so listen carefully and be straightforward in you answers. Check out-
